Meanderings and Musings from Our Rector

Dear Beloved Community of Trinity,

The wind is blowing, and the Spirit is whipping up good news and good ministries around Trinity. Take a gander at the many articles and ads for upcoming ways to engage in life-giving and transformative ministries and events. It is a bit dizzying to take it all in, but it is GOOD to see, hear and experience the emergence of new life all around us!

Having just hit our 9-month mark since we arrived in Bend, I just have to continue my mantra, “Thank You” and “Wow!” I cannot say that enough. Our life here has been life-giving and transformative on all fronts for my family; and in many ways, “we have only just begun...” (Can’t you just hear Karen Carpenter’s melodic voice calling us to live, to look at new horizons, to watch for signs along the way and to work together?)



Without reiterating what is already said within this Trumpet, I do want to offer some words of clarification, good news and thanksgiving:

- First of all, I want to share a liturgical tidbit about bells, chanting, and incense, all of which are a bit “higher church” than the usual here at Trinity. The bells that have been rung amidst the Eucharistic prayer each Sunday in Easter are called “Sanctus bells,” named for the initial ringing during the Sanctus or the “Holy, holy, holy.” Per an article in the publication “Adoremus”: “The use of bells in Church dates back to the fifth century... (and) The practice of ringing bells to create a joyful noise for the Lord during the Mass is based to some degree on the use of *tintinnabula* (or tiny bells) or crotal bells that were a part of ancient Judaic worship.” In other words, bells are not new. From a practical standpoint, they are rung to call the people’s attention to actions such as taking, blessing, breaking and giving the elements of bread and wine at communion. For me, they are audible “Alleluias” that awaken my heart and spirit to the presence of the Holy in our midst and with us.

Likewise, the chanted portions of the service on Easter and during the 10 AM service, as well as the use of incense at the Easter Vigil (and soon on Pentecost), have been offered as an enrichment of our prayer, to elevate or lift our voices, hearts and prayers to God.

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By making minor changes to the liturgy, we are made more aware of the changes in our liturgical seasons and experience the theology of a given season through the use of different words, songs, actions and even seating arrangements.

I hope the changes have not been too jarring, but instead life-giving; and I welcome your thoughts, reflections and considerations about our liturgical practices. In particular, I want to be mindful of allergies or sensitivities. So, let me know if the incense is hard on your sniffer or breathing. Some folks have expressed their joy at such offerings, but I know that may not be the case for all. Again, as the saying about liturgical practices and pieties goes: "All may, some will, none must."

- Another item I would like to lift up is that I am happy to announce the hiring of Sarah Irby as a new, part-time "Assistant to the Sexton." (I am referring to the Sarah who moved to Bend with us from Mississippi, not Sarah Irvin our Music Director.) By providing help in the realm of weekly cleaning and hospitality work, our Sexton Casey will be more available to attend to larger projects that require more technical skill and time, in particular some of the deferred maintenance and renovations that need attention sooner than later. And the reality is that Trinity's facilities are being used more and more by more and more groups. Thus, the work required to ensure well-tended and welcoming spaces is more demanding, too. We are excited about this new hire because it is a win-win for the church, for Casey and for Sarah.
- In addition, I want to share a few words about Spring Collegium, the gathering of the clergy of the diocese which was hosted so generously here at Trinity in late May. Thank you to the Women and Men of Trinity who stepped up and made our clergy feel welcome and well-fed while they were here! As the Rev. Ray Jeff Sprier put it in the thank you note: "Trinity is still a well-oiled machine of grace and hospitality!"

Our time at Collegium was filled with good fellowship and community-building, the sharing of ministry ideas, resources and stories, and meaningful prayers and personal reflections. Part of our time was spent discussing our next steps in seeking a Bishop for the Episcopal Diocese of Eastern Oregon (EDEO). For the past two years, the Standing Committee, with the support of the Presiding Bishop's office, has been pursuing a new model of a "flattened" approach to diocesan leadership. It would involve the Standing Committee serving as the Ecclesiastical Authority and an Assisting Bishop being called to serve in a very part-time capacity to attend to the pastoral, liturgical and larger church duties of a Bishop for EDEO.

After considerable discernment, research and work in that direction, we, the Standing Committee on which I now serve, learned a lot and have decided to go in a different direction. With the support of our new Presiding Bishop's office, we are in the process of seeking a Provisional Bishop, similar to when Bishop Nedi Rivera stepped onto the scene in EDEO. A Provisional Bishop is an elected position, but is a person who would have been consecrated and serves or has served as a Bishop in another diocese. Our hope is to have a single candidate to present for election at a special Diocesan Council early in 2026.

If elected, the Provisional Bishop would serve beginning in spring 2026 and step into full diocesan leadership in the summer, as Bishop Pat's term of service comes to an end. The Provisional would serve for a specific period of time, e.g. two or three years, with the possibility of extending that time. While not the same as electing a Diocesan Bishop, electing a Provisional Bishop will give EDEO more time to discern next steps, while remaining a viable and whole diocese. It is a good option for the time being. If you have questions, let me know.

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Meanderings and Musings from Our Rector (cont.)

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- On a happy note, I did want to share how much my family has enjoyed gallivanting around Bend and around Oregon this spring. We have managed local-ish adventures to Smith Rock, Mt. Bachelor, Shevlin Park, Sawyer Park, Riley Ranch, and many other parks; and we have traversed the winding roads across the mountains to Portland, Hood River and Newport. The expanse of geographical variation, interesting roadside attractions and good eats at restaurants along the way have made each trip memorable and set the stage for more travels around the Pacific Northwest. And our summer is shaping up to be busy with more travel plans, projects around the house, day and overnight camps, the family retreat at Suttle Lake, tent camping at Crater Lake and, probably/hopefully, a trip back to MS to see family in August. It is GOOD and holy to be here and to have such glorious opportunities for our family. We give thanks!



Trinity Maintenance and Updates

For the last ten years we have had very limited need for maintenance on our campus. This is due to the fact that we basically had new buildings that required very little attention.

Now the buildings are no longer new, and our grace period has ended. Our new Sexton Casey has been busy this last year, addressing issues that needed attention. He has done a great job bringing many basic functions up to date and has created a schedule to maintain these building needs.



The next step is to address larger projects that are in need of attention:

- **Painting.** The first item is that the exterior of both buildings is overdue to be painted. The Vestry has been presented with three bids and has approved moving forward. This summer we have plans to do the work.
- **Sealing and Striping Parking Lots.** We will also be sealing and striping the Family Kitchen parking lot and the back side of Trinity.
- **Gutters.** The clogged gutters on the west side of St Helens are also being addressed with long term solutions.
- **Sidewalks.** The Building and Grounds Committee also is seeking bids on repairing the sidewalks around St Helens and Family Kitchen.
- **Wheelchair Lift.** The wheelchair lift in Brooks Hall is also an issue we are addressing. We have spoken to maintenance people. They will no longer work on the lift. We were told it is obsolete; parts are no longer available. They do not want the liability.
- **Update Family Kitchen Accessibility and Function.** The Family Kitchen side of St Helens also needs some updating. The only work that has been done on the interior is to remove the large wood burning stove in the Bill Ellis Room. This area of the building needs some updating. We need to make it more accessible and more functional.

As we move into the future, we will be addressing all of these opportunities.

Note: There will NOT be an 8 AM service on June 8th. All are invited and encouraged to come at 10 AM.





New Pollinator Garden Gets Planted by Amity Creek Students



A new collaboration has begun to grow with our neighbors at Amity Creek Magnet School. Last fall our Vestry approved a proposal by second grade teacher, Lauren Romney, to plant a pollinator garden on the plot of property to the left of our main entrance stairs that lead to St. Helens Hall. Aided by Lisa Sanco, Executive Director of Worthy Environmental (connected with Worthy Brewing), the planting began in May. Below is a note from Lauren:



I just wanted to share that the planting party we held last week went beautifully! Lisa was so helpful preparing everything ahead of time and was incredibly knowledgeable about the care of the plants we put in the ground.

The second graders have been studying plants and pollinators for months, and they were so excited to get their hands on some! They seeded and planted their very own sunflowers that line the back wall of the garden. Lisa said that these native pollinators gardens usually take 3 years to be at full blooming capacity, so look out 2028! What is beautiful about that is, the second-grade class will be 5th graders by then and able to see the progress and potential of the garden in their last year.

Thank you so much for allowing us to engage in enriching fieldwork and deepening the learning process for the children in my class. We appreciate you so much.

Plans are underway to develop and install a sign, made by the students, which will explain what a pollinator garden is and why it is important. It will be exciting to watch the garden grow!

At the start of 2025, Trinity transitioned to a new accounting program called **Realm**. This upgrade significantly enhances our ability to manage contributions, streamline payroll, track daily bank deposits, and generate current financial reports and trends. Realm also integrates more efficiently with our updated QuickBooks system and offers many additional features.

Looking ahead, Realm will eventually be accessible to all Trinity members, allowing you to view and manage your personal contribution records. Our Administrator, Treasurer, and Contributions Secretary are actively learning and implementing the many advantages of this new system.

What This Means for You

Starting **June 1, 2025**, you will receive your **contribution statement for January through May** via **email** instead of through the mail. This change helps Trinity save on postage, paper, and envelope costs.



Please note:

- This is **not** your official tax statement.
- Your **End-of-Year Contribution Statement** will still be sent in **January 2026** for tax purposes.
- The mid-year statement is intended to ensure your contributions have been accurately recorded.

We appreciate your patience as we navigate this new system — there may be a few bumps along the way, but we're confident it will ultimately benefit everyone.

At the recent Newcomers' Brunch, several new Trinity members expressed an interest in becoming volunteers at the Council on Aging, joining a cadre of Trinity folks who assist me in Trinity's ministry to support the Council's meal delivery program.

The Council has provided the following list of volunteers needed for their Wednesday, Thursday and Friday in-person dining shifts:

1. **10:00 AM to 1:00 PM - Server #1.** This person sets up the dining room and serves plated meals during the meal service.
2. **10:30 AM to 1:30 PM - Server #2.** This person helps finish setting up the dining room, serves guests plated meals during the meal service and helps clear plates and take them to the kitchen.
3. **11:30 AM to 1:30 PM - Plater/ Dishwasher.** This person helps the chef plate the food and assists the dishwasher by putting away clean dishes.
4. **Noon until 2 PM - Check in / Cleaner.** This person greets guests at the front door and records/checks off their names. This person also sweeps the floor after lunch and helps with light clean up.



The Council on Aging is in dire need of more people to fill these shifts. If you can assume one of these shifts, one day a week, or even if only one day a month, please contact Donna Rae Benson, Lead for this Ministry at Trinity.

Making a Difference with Love: Justice, Peace and Mercy

Probably since the beginnings of Trinity, there have been iterations of ministries that have attended to one of our core Baptismal callings: to "strive for justice and peace among all people." At this juncture in our common life, caring and concerned folks have come together under the leadership of our LOV group on two occasions to discern next steps and how we might work together to make a difference.

At our May 22 meeting, we approved a name – Trinity Episcopal Action Coalition (TEAC) – and a mission statement as people committed to "sharing God's love by promoting justice, peace and mercy in our community and our world."

This coalition will serve as an umbrella for five primary ministry areas: Creation Care; Equality and Equal Rights; Racial Justice and Immigration; Socio-Economic Justice, including housing and food insecurity and access to medical and mental health resources; and Preserving Democracy.

We hope to make a difference by living into a Commitment to community service; engaging in Policy Advocacy (communicating with elected leaders about legislation); and participating as Public Witnesses by being involved in efforts to stand in solidarity with the "least of these." It is our hope that, by being intentional and organized on the parish level, we can support and encourage individuals to use their voice, their vote and their very presence in the name of Love. Furthermore, thanks to Mary Keath and Gail Webber, our work as the TEAC will be shared with the larger community through our affiliation with the Bend Action Coalition (BAC).



What is the Bend Action Coalition?

Mission: Bend Action Coalition is a group of progressive faith-based fellowships – Bend United Methodist, First Presbyterian, Grace First Lutheran, Storydwelving Fellowship, Sunriver Christian Fellowship, Temple Bethel, Trinity Episcopal, and Unitarian Universalist Fellowship – who are driven by compassion, and work together for peace and justice during these challenging times.

Bend Action Coalition shared values: As people of faith and fierce love, we insist upon several premises which call us to strive to make a difference with love:

- We operate out of a theology of abundance, not scarcity. **God provides**, and there is and always will be enough for all to thrive.
