Meanderings and Musings from Our Rector

Dear Beloved Community of Trinity,

It's sum, sum, summertime, and I am looking forward to some easy-going evenings with our family, including Board games, Legos and laughter! Board Games have been an important pastime for my family and me over the years, be it classics like Life, Monopoly, Clue, Backgammon, Chinese checkers, Yahtzee or Risk or more recent games like Pictionary, Ticket to Ride, Settlers of Catan or Keys to the Castle. These and so many more, as well as puzzles, are stacked on our bookshelf in the den and come out less frequently than I would like; but they are a source of great joy, good fellowship and meaningful lessons in negotiation, strategy and relationship-building.



It would seem that negotiation, strategy and relationship-building have been and are key aspects of our life together at Trinity and with our many partners and the greater community. Of late, there have been shifts in our staffing, some of which were mentioned over the past month, but I wanted to reiterate how glad we are to have Christian Clark, Artistic Director of Central Oregon Mastersingers, returning to serve as our Director of Music beginning in July.

Another recent change has been the departure of "Thrive" from our St. Helens Hall facilities. They were good "shared maintenance" partners, but we are pleased for their expanding staff and program that they have found more adequate facilities for their good work. Their departure presents Trinity with opportunities to expand space for children and youth ministries, as well as to do some strategic planning around how we use our facilities, how we might renovate and make St. Helens more accessible and useful, how we might grow and expand our ministries, and what spaces we might make available for future "shared maintenance" partners. Fear not! There are many non-profits and community-related entities seeking office and meeting space, but we want to do the strategic work before jumping off into new agreements.

Another area that requires serious strategic conversations and relationship-building is with our Family Kitchen partners, as well as with our neighbors and with the city, county and faith-based companions in the Bend Action Coalition.

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Meanderings and Musings from Our Rector (cont.)

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As any who have been to Trinity lately will know, the population of unhoused persons visiting our property and dining at Family Kitchen has grown significantly. With that has come some undesirable outcomes, such as more uninvited “overnight guests,” more individuals staying in their cars near Trinity, more debris on the property and more issues with drug use and drug paraphernalia on the property. Our staff has borne the brunt of these challenges, but we and our neighbors are aware of the challenges to everyone’s safety and security posed by these realities. Furthermore, it must be stated that these issues are not a Family Kitchen problem nor a Trinity problem, but a Bend problem.

Yes, we embarked on conversations nearly two years ago with the goal of Family Kitchen finding a new home. Unfortunately, locating an appropriate place has proven very difficult. Then, with their transitions in staff, they paused the search. And, in part, they continued to pause based on my recommendation that they give their new Executive Director time to get situated in her new role (and me in my new role at Trinity). Now, prompted by recent challenges and after having met with the Vestry, the Wardens and I have entered again into intentional conversations with Olivia, the Executive Director and Rob, the president of the board of Family Kitchen. We have asked them to take some clear steps to reduce the stress and strain on our system and to heighten safety practices and security. In turn, they are working with their board and their staff to make necessary changes for this continued interim period. Once we have more details, we will notify the congregation.

In the meantime, we are making strides to work more collaboratively, and they are re-upping efforts to seek long-term solutions, which includes looking for a new site. Furthermore, I am in the process of seeking a meeting with some of our clergy partners with the BAC and community leaders. This is a larger issue than just what is happening on the corner of Wall and Idaho, and it calls for more voices and people at the table, more negotiations, more strategizing and more relationship-building to do the hard work of seeking compassionate and life-giving resolutions. We ask your continued patience and prayers for all involved.

In a recent sermon I shared some words that I would like to share here, words that seem fitting for this time at Trinity, this time in our community and this time in our nation and the world. It seems necessary and vital to discerning next steps for much of what I have written above and across our mission and ministry that we abide the words from one of my favorite series, “Call the Midwife.” In one episode, Dr. Turner assigns a prescription for helping Sister Monica Joan, one of the elder nuns. “Listen attentively, Reassure gently, and Love generously.”

At the close of that sermon, I shared a modified version of a prayer by John D. Rayner. Some folks have asked that I share this prayer publicly. Let us pray:

When evil darkens our world, give us light.
When despair numbs our souls, give us hope.
When we stumble and fall, lift us up.
When doubts assail us, give us faith.
When nothing seems sure, give us trust.
When ideals fade, give us vision.
When we lose our way, be our guide!
That we may find serenity and healing grace in your presence,
and a sense of calling and fullness of life
as we strive to do and be your will on earth as it is in heaven. Amen.

Go in peace, friends. Be the light. Be the hope. Be God’s healing presence in the world. Be well, y’all!

Speaking of parishioners spending lots of time and energy on parish events, have you ever noticed that it's often the same people over and over doing all the work? - **Child:** \$24 – this includes admission and small hot dog, bag of chips, and 16 oz. soda or bottle of water.


Sign-Up. You can sign up following each service on July 6th and 13th. Payment is due at that time – check made out to Trinity or credit card (if on file at Trinity).

Save the Date: Condega Celebration, September 21st 4 PM

Little did we realize back in 2000 that 25 years later our church would still be actively involved in Condega, a small rural town in Nicaragua. Initially we responded to the devastation caused by Hurricane Mitch. That first year the vestry sent \$5,000 to aid with food and housing. For the next several years we sent hundreds of dollars for various small projects. Now we annually send between \$25,000 and \$35,000 for projects the people of Condega have come to depend on. This year we sent \$31,601 to Condega.

There are two programs we sponsor annually.



- **Deaf Children.** Starting in 2008 we began to fund a program for deaf children. Initially these children were in a dormitory, now they live with families in the community. The deaf program allows children from rural communities to come into town and attend school. Were it not for this program these children would receive no education in their rural villages. This year we sent \$9,000 to provide care for nine children.
- **School Uniforms and School Supplies.** Trinity annually purchases school uniforms and school supplies for the neediest children in Condega. Every year around 400 children receive a shirt/blouse, skirt/pants, socks, shoes and a backpack for school. This year we sent \$8,131 for school uniforms and \$500 for school supplies.

Through the years we have contributed to many community projects, both large and small. These projects have almost exclusively focused on the needs of children, often children with special needs. We have built projects as large as a pergola and as small as repairs to an outhouse. This year we sent \$3,030 for several smaller projects.

We could not do this work in Condega were it not for Nola Nackerud, our representative in Condega. Nola is a retired Peace Corps volunteer who lives in Condega. She is highly respected in the community and brings creditability to our program. She makes sure the school uniforms get distributed, the foster parents get paid, the outhouses get built and so much more. This year we paid Nola \$10,000 for her services to our program.

Trinity's presence in Nicaragua is made possible by the generous support of our congregation. Every year the Condega Advisory Committee works hard to raise money to keep this program going.

We have two primary sources of funding.

- Each September we have the Condega Celebration. This fun evening of food, fellowship and sales raises about two thirds of our annual income.
- The other third comes from individual donations. We so appreciate your support and look forward to continuing our work in Condega for a 26th year.

Red Door Bake Sale and Bazaar

This year, we have a new name and a new location. The committee chose a name that we feel better identifies what we do. The community knows us as the church with The Red Door. Our focus is the bake sale and bazaar.

We will be having the sale on November 22nd from 9 AM-2 PM in Brooks Hall.

The proceeds will be going to local non-profits. This year, more than ever, the local charities will need our help. Someone asked, "which charities are you talking about?" The Outreach Committee will choose the local non-profits when we know how much money we raise. It will probably be by a grant system. If you are interested in being on the Outreach Committee, please contact Adrienne Garrison.

In the fall, Carolyn Richardson will be having a day to make the Apple-Cranberry Pies to put in the freezer for the sale. Folks can buy them on the day of the sale to bake at home on a day of their choosing. People come from all over just to buy one of the pies. We will be needing lots of homemade cookies and holiday breads.
